## **Peter and Apostolic Tradition**

<u>Jesus appeared to Cephas,</u> then to the twelve. After that <u>Jesus appeared to more than</u> <u>500 brothers at once.</u> 1Cor 15:1-11

Paul proclaims to the Corinthians that he has a unity with the apostles, as their leader....and with Jesus' teaching of 500 "brothers."

Paul emphasizes the unified teaching authority of the apostles, whose successors we call our bishops, and declares his own participation in this teaching authority stating:

You are also being saved. <u>If you hold fast to the word I preached to you</u>, unless you believed in vain. For I handed on to you as of first importance what I also received:

that Christ died for our sins in accordance with Scripture;
